After judging, plants are to be taken to Seaford Shopping Centre. Please make prior arrangements if you need your plants transported.

TRADING TABLE: Set-up Saturday 23rd September at 4.00p.m. Members may bring their plants then or anytime during the week. Show times are the Club's bread and butter. Please bring along any plants you have for sale. **Remember** Sunday 24th September will be the best selling day from 12 noon.

ASSISTANCE NEEDED: The Committee needs members' assistance in the following areas:

Volunteer to help on the Trading Table.

Ask for swing tickets and selling sheets.

Provide Flowering Orchid plants for the display, prepared in Show condition for judging with clean pots. Please do not water plants on the day you put them into the Show, the day before is better. Committee will look after your plant's needs while in the Show.

Provide Trading Table plants in good condition with clean pots. You may bring in plants without flowers but please include a photo of the bloom.

MOST IMPORTANT: The Show Marshall will ring any member if for some reason she feels that any plants may be starting to show any stress.

REMEMBER: To **show** your plants at the Spring Show you must be a financial member and have owned your plants for at least 6 months.







PREPARING ORCHIDS FOR SALE

- 1. Select the plants that you want to let go.
- 2. Obtain Plant Sheets and Plant Price Tags from Lucy in the weeks prior to the Sale.
- 3. Clean all pots. Wipe them over with a damp cloth to remove all white residue of salt from the pots. If these pots have been recycled from somewhere else, please make sure any old advertising and price stickers are all cleaned off.
- 4. Check all stakes and add more if necessary and re-tie.
- 5. Remove old brown husks from bulbs and remove weeds, snails, scale etc.
- 6. Remove all dry ends on the leaves and shape to a point.
- 7. Wipe leaves over with a mixture of milk and water (1 part milk to 10 parts water). Do not overdo the milk by adding extra as the fat in the milk will clog the pores in the leaves which will then yellow off and die.
- 8. Water all plants 2-3 days before, not on the morning that you are bringing them in. This water really makes a mess on our clothes, tablecloths and the floor.
- 9. The <u>SALES SHEET</u> is a carbonless duplicated sheet, so both sheets are to be used together. Press down firmly on a hard surface to imprint on the second page. The original and duplicated sheets must be lodged with plants.
 - Print your name in the top left hand corner of the page
 - Print your club member number in the top right hand corner
 - Rule a narrow column down the left side of the page. This column is for the plant number 1—30. Please use consecutive numbering for additional sheets i.e. 31-60 for page 2, etc.
 - On the right hand side you need a column a bit wider for the selling price of the plant.
 Be reasonable with the pricing, not greedy. Either you want to sell it or you don't.
 Take into account the number of spikes and condition of the plant. If you are not sure of pricing, ask someone.
 - The centre section is for the description e.g. Cym, Den, Cat, etc. and the name and colour of your plant e.g. *Cym.* Without Peer 'Soft Touch' (pink).
- 10. Next write your **PRICE TAGS**. It's a good idea to do both sides of the tag.
 - Your member number goes on the left hand side
 - The plant number on the right hand side. Circle the plant number.
 - Write your price under these numbers.

Make sure that the tag on the plant matches the information on your sales sheet . These plant price tags need to be checked off on your sheet by another person when you bring you plants in. You can help by reading out the numbers and price on the tag with the other person checking off the list. If there is a discrepancy, it needs to be attended to. Give both copies of the sheet to the person checking the plants off. If you need a copy for yourself, take a third copy. However in most cases you will be given one sheet back with your cheque.

We hope these notes help you. Lucy is always around to assist you further if needed, so just ask for help should you need it.



EXHIBITORS' RULES FOR SHOWS

- 1. All exhibitors must be financial members of the South Coast Orchid Club of South Australia Incorporated.
- 2. Entries are free.
- 3. Exhibitors are bound by the Constitution, Rules, By-Laws and Special Show Rules of the Club.
- 4. The opinion of the judges is final and binding and no objections or discussions regarding results will be considered, with one exception, which is an infringement by an Exhibitor of any of the Club's Rules, By-Laws or Show Rules. Any objection in this case must be lodged with the Club Show Marshall/Secretary.
- 5. The Club accepts no responsibility for any loss, damage or infection suffered by any plant or blooms exhibited.
- 6. The Club reserves the right to photograph any of the exhibits if it should so wish.
- 7. In all matters regarding the arrangement and conduct of the show (with the exception of judging) the Show Marshall/Secretary is the ruling authority.
- 8. No plants suspected by the Club Virus adjudicators of being infected with virus will be eligible for competition and such plants will be completely isolated from all other plants.
- 9. The exhibition areas will be closed during the judging. No exhibitors, the public or members other than the Show Marshall/Secretary, Judges of the Club, Associate Judges and other persons appointed to assist in judging will be allowed to remain in the exhibition area during this period.
- 10. Non-exhibitors are requested not to congregate in the exhibition area prior to judging so that officials can arrange plants and perform other necessary duties.
- 11. Plants must be labelled with the coloured labels provided by the Club with the exhibitor's number and name of plant. These are available from the Show Marshall/Secretary or his/her nominee.
- 12. Exhibitors are to ensure that all labelling be neatly and correctly performed in accordance with the procedure laid down on orchid Nomenclature and Registration.
- 13. All plants benched for judging at the show must be made available to be in the Club display for the show week.
- 14. All exhibits must be benched by the nominated time on the nominated day for Judging. The nominated day and time will be published in the Club Gazette in the month prior to the Show.
- 15. Exhibits must not be removed before nominated time on the nominated day at the end of the Display week. The nominated day and time will be published in the Club Gazette in the month prior to the Show.
- 16. Exhibitors unable to remove their own plants from the show should provide the per son so doing with a letter of authorization.
- 17. Damage caused in transit to the show should be reported to the Show Marshall/ Secretary or Registrar of Judges prior to judging.
- 18. If, in the opinion of the judges, a plant is not worthy of an award or prize in any specified section, then none shall be given.

CYMBIDIUM ORCHIDS

(sim BID ee um)

Position:

These orchids are epiphytes, which means that in the wild, they grow in forks of trees where they receive dappled sunlight all day. So in cultivation, the ideal position for optimum growth and flowers is filtered sun all day - e. g. a shade house with 50%-70% shade cloth. This should be situated in an open position with no trees or buildings



that will give shade. If this is not possible, give your cymbidiums the most filtered sunlight per day that you can or place them under a deciduous tree, on the northern side, so that they receive the most sun in winter and yet are protected from the hot overhead sun in summer. This will also protect them from light frosts. If regular or heavy frosts are prevalent in your area, a solid cover, e.g. a clear fibreglass type of material cover will be necessary in winter. This is also a good idea when they are in spike or flower as it protects the blooms from rain and hail etc.

To produce flower spikes, a temperature drop to approximately 10 C for a short period each day is needed **in** spring and summer. Watering in the evenings on hot days will achieve this. In some areas this drop occurs naturally.

Watering.

A rough watering guide can be given by temperature:If the temperature is under 20-C, water once a week, depending on rainfall.
When the temperature is between 20c and 30C, water 2 - 3 times a week.
If the temperature if over 30c, water every day, and twice a day if it is very hot
However other factors can affect drying, hot north winds and dew fall for example.

Potting mix.

It is easier if all your orchids are potted in the same type of mix and pots, so if you buy or win an orchid, it will pay you to re-pot it, using the same mix as your other cymbidiums. This will help with the watering, as they are more likely to dry out evenly. There is a wide range of potting media that can be used; the main thing is that the mix is free-draining, as the roots don't like to be soggy or waterlogged. The medium should be slightly acid - PH5. Plain pine bark can be used or a mixture of pine bark, sand and marble chips. For small collections of orchids, a commercial cymbidium potting mix can be used and is easier than mixing your own.

Dividing or Repotting

When dividing or reporting your orchids, pot into a size pot that the orchid can stay in for three years. This is the time span for reporting, even if the orchid doesn't need dividing as the potting mix breaks down in this time and will hold too much moisture. Repot as soon as flowers are finished or picked, spring is usually the best time and before the end of November if possible. Autumn is also a good time. The main thing is not to repot when it is very hot or cold. When dividing the plant, leave at least 3 green bulbs with leaves on the main division, as this is a good flowering sized plant.

Fertilising.

Slow release fertilizers can be used every three months. If using other fertilizers in powder form that are mixed with water, always use half strength and there is less likelihood of burning the plant. Use fortnightly except in winter when no fertilizer is needed.

This orchid is not judged as an Australian Dendrobium because of the parentage. It is judged in the Any Other Genera Hybrid section.

Orchid Culture Notes for August

The last month of Winter is already on our doorstep and the Spring shows not that far away. August weather is still cold but we seem to get enough 20° to remind us that Wnter is starting to lose hold. After a very cold and wet July this is surely a positive to look forward to.

We are nearing the peak months of our flowering season especially for those with collections dominated by natives and cymbidiums. This year displays have seen quite a high percentage of plants showing the effects of cold and exposure. Even when grown under cover the effects of botrytis is apparent and although we will soon enter a drying phase, most of our flowering plants will still suffer the effects. The only way to combat this is to remove plants to an area under cover where the air is quite dry. That is why I test the boundaries at home and load up my laundry. Even though I have an 8 x 3 flowering house outside, I too cannot escape the marking of the flowers that is so bad this year. The laundry will provide me the dryness I need and I can always hang my clothes in the flowering house!

Very soon it will be time to look at the annual task of re-potting and division. Whilst still a couple of months away, now is a good time to take stock of the numbers of plants that need work so we can stock up on pots, mix, etc. I usually start looking at the seedling catalogues about now to get my orders in to coincide with Spring. No point really subjecting little plants to our cold Winter unless you have the right protection, so getting them at a time of year with the weather warming and the plants entering new growth is a sound decision if we are to get them underway.

Many orchids are still resting and a keen eye will already see the commencement of new shoots to herald the start of a new season. It is hard to believe but by the end of August we have already put nearly 90 minutes of extra daylight onto the Winter solstice. This is plenty of daylight increase to tell the plants it is time to start moving again soon.

Not all plants rest over winter. Zygopetalums are one orchid that do not appear to have a resting period, as are the cymbidiums. Sure they slow up but never really go dormant. With weather still cool and the humidity high, watering is still infrequent and should be applied only when the plants are dry and ideally left to the warmer days. Zygopetalum new growths should be well advanced so stick with the higher nitrogen to balanced feeds until they bulb up later on.





Those looper caterpillars are quite bad this year and have been all over Winter so regular inspection of any chewing activity under the leaves is a must. The cold and wet of this winter has also taken toll on some of the new growths and they have rotted out or at best lost a few leaves. Either way this growth will be severely restricted and will not build up a new bulb, if it even does so and unlikely to produce a new growth big enough to flower off next year.

Now is the time to reduce the watering on the natives and dry them out somewhat. In the eastern states the Spring months are the driest part of the year and this is where most, if not all our Australian natives come from. Watch out for aphids on the new spikes and keep dry. One cold and wet episode will have buds dropping like flies. If you can, try to maximise light levels as the natives flower to bring out the colour.


Cattleyas will soon show new growth eyes developing from the base of the previous years canes and the sheaths of the spring flowering species and hybrids will start to fill out. If these sheaths show any sign of fungal spots I would be peeling them back to expose the buds and keep the buds dry. Leaving the spots to enlarge will invariably mark or even rot out the buds. A Cattleya will only flower once off a psuedobulb. Watch out for any fungal problems near the growth buds. This is usually indicated by the presence of black sheaths. Preventative sprays of fungicides can certainly reduce this somewhat.



Oncidiums have now finished their flowering and are generally resting. Those in active growth are only watered if conditions are very dry or the plant grown under cover. Feeding is monthly at my place for these as the cool temperatures slow down the plants metabolism and their need for supplementary feeding. I only feed Oncidiums that show active roots.

Even though the Oncidiums have largely finished there are plenty of Oncidiinae intergenerics around that will grow cold and provide colour for much of the year. Colmanaras, Beallaras, Odontocidiums (now Oncidiums) and Vuylstekearas are just a few of the complex that are quite happy here grown above the Cymbidiums. I also find that these intergenerics are quite variable in their flowering times as well and even have the luxury of sporting a second spike after the first one has died down. A little more cover over Winter will improve your results as these do mark easily.





The majority of the terrestrials we see benched will begin flowering from now on. Starting off with the greenhoods (*Pterostylis*) and later on the donkey orchids (*Diuris*) and the sun orchids (*Thelymytra*). Keep evenly moist and try to keep the light levels up. Weak feeds of organic based feeds like your seaweed and fish emulsions will assist growth. Avoid chemical fertilisers. Pull out weeds as they appear and remove any plants that show signs of virus or fungal problems. This is usually identified by odd markings.and yellowing of the leaves. Fungus affected plants literally fall out of the pot when you lift up a leaf. Virus in *Diuris* shows up with brown markings.

Paphiopedilums are well into their flowering season and like many genera are easy to grow once the culture and correct conditions are provided. The large standard Paphiopedilums (standard referring to shape) usually peak this time of year with the smaller novelties later on as the weather warms. The trick with Paphiopedilums is to keep them evenly moist and moving. They don't mind being grown close together and take up little space and are a low light orchid. So for those that have a shady section in the shade house a small collection of cool growing Paphiopedilums is worth a try. They are not a hungry feeder but little and often is the key.



storage organs like some of the caned and pseudobulb featured orchids hence they need constant moisture. They resent any salt build up in their mix so regular flushing with pure rain water is beneficial. They also like to be re-potted on a regular basis to keep them moving and once a year is not too often.

A new crop of Spring and Summer weeds will soon show up and should be removed as soon as they appear. Continue to treat for slugs and snails as many genera are now in flower and these new soft spikes make good tucker. Wrapping some copper strip or even cotton wool around the base of the spikes will deter them. Please remove the cotton wool before you show your orchid. We judges want to judge an orchid and not a poodle.

Observe for any fungal problems. With the warming weather this will become a bigger problem over the next few months. Remove dead leaves and flowers as soon as you can as these when wet will attract fungal problems overnight. Some plants that do show signs of rot may be telling you something about your culture as well. Factors such as I am too wet, too cold, lack of air movement, my mix has broken down or I have been damaged, are just some of the many causes of fungal attack. I have been on many orchid walks in the wild yet have never seen the fungal problems there that we have in our collections. So it is clear that these problems are our doing and we must be able to identify why and act accordingly. It is what makes us a better grower, the ability to observe and act. We will never eradicate these problems given that the majority of the genera we grow are so far removed from the species that make up their background that their own natural defences will not work. The best offence to defence is good culture.

The key to August is to provide flowering and near flowering plants the cover they need to avoid environmental damage. Pest numbers are still down but it won't be long before their numbers increase. Observe plants resting periods and keep an eye out for any developing problems with fungal issues. September is on our doorstep and with it another growing season is about ready to begin.
