### **Peter Chiles... cymbidium enthusiast!! This months Speaker.**

The cymbidium bug bit in 1972 and I've been hooked ever since.

I had looked over the orchids at the Royal Show and something urged me to purchase my first few plants... Father's Day, a week or so after the Royal Show seemed a fairly good excuse as it was my first year as a dad.

By Christmas I had a new shade house 18 feet square with about half a dozen plants in it. They were very lonely but that was soon fixed as my collection grew. I was fascinated with the way that orchids were grown from seed. The then new mericloning process and the use of colchicine to produce tetraploid plants was also quite exciting to me and inside two years I was doing my own flasking, mericloning and colchicine treatments in our own kitchen... you could try it too!

During 1975 we moved to a two-acre property on the eastern outskirts of Gawler with a view to producing cymbidiums commercially. I have since focused on the hobby and retail marketing of our plants from our own nursery and we try to maintain a large display of plants from June to October each year.

Over the ensuing years I have come to realise that the most important plants for us in South Australia are those that grow and flower very easily here in SA as well as being attractive in form and colour... this is a very big ask and I believe that only one or two plants fit these exacting requirements in every 10,000 new seedlings flowered.



## FEBRUARY FLORAL COMPETITION RESULTS

A small but interesting benching this month covering a wide range of genera for this time of the year. Malcolm Tiggeman bought in, for us to view, a Spathoglottis Othello which he purchased recently from Bunnings. This had a considerable number of beautiful 1" (sorry—25mm) pink flowers on a branched rame. During the plant commentary, we saw how Jane grows her Phragmepediums in self watering pots made from soft drink bottles. The mass of healthy root growth was clearly visible through the clear plastic. In nature Phrags often grow on the rocky banks of rivers with their roots down in the water. A tip given over coffee, was to use green "Sprite" bottles as this avoids the necessity to put the clear pots within black pots to stop the growth of algae.

I think Norm Gitsham needs some competition on the second division benches, so come on you second division growers I am certain you have some nice plants there for us to see.

### Open Division

#### *Flower of the Division and Flower of the Night*

*Paph. parishii* Grown by D. & J. Higgs

This species Paphiopedilum had a single healthy growth with a single inflorescence of 4 fully open flowers. These were 55mm wide and 159mm long with the petals accounting for 106mm of this length. The colours were quite strong for this species. The dorsal and ventral sepals were a pale creamy green with strong thin vertical green lining while the petals were similarly coloured but with some almost black spotting for the first third, turning to a purple brown for the remaining length. Some of the spots along the edge of the petals had short hairs protruding from them. An excellent example of this species.

## First Division

### *Flower of the Division*

#### ***Enc. alata 'Marion' grown by M. Baulderstone***

This plant had 4 growths and a single branched inflorescence, 300mm long, with 7 open flowers and 11 buds. It will be even more spectacular when all these buds are open. The flowers were greenish cream in the centre with the ends of the tepals a nice deep brown purple. The spear shaped ( hastate) lip had a cream base with brown purple striations and a yellow edge. The flowers measured 43mm wide and 59mm long.

This large plant, with 6 inflorescences, was overgrowing its 6" (150mm) squat pot. It had 13, 80cm, blooms of soft pink with a whitish labellum and dark pink throat.

### ***Odontoglossum crispum***

Odonts hail from South America and grow at some altitude which means that most are more cool growing than many other species from this area.

Odont crispum can be grown in Adelaide providing it is kept in a cooler and more shaded area

I grow my plant about 300 mm. From the floor and well below all other plants.
