SPECIES GROUP

Members of the Orchid Species Club were again treated to a mass display of interesting and varied species, some 34 plants in total.

As with all these meetings the species varied from the tiny Australian *Cyrtostylis reniformis* with its 10mm dark red flowers looking like a swarm of mosquitos, the common name for this genus of orchid, of which there are about 20 species, is 'The Mosquito Orchid' to the large plant *of Dockrillia teretifolia* mounted on a piece of melaleuca

branch being about one metre from top to bottom. This plant belonged to Lucy Speer and had recently been awarded. The common name for this Australian species is 'The Bridal Veil Orchid' and the plant brought in looked like a white wedding dress train. This is quite an easy orchid to cultivate but patience is required to achieve the results Lucy has. Another large plant was *Calanthe vestita* a terrestrial species from Burma, Indonesia & Thailand. Very variable in colour ranging from pure white through pinks to deep red. The plant benched had 5 long racemes of white flowers with a

bright red labellum. An interesting orchid in that it flowers after the deciduous leaves fall exposing the 10cm tall silvery pseudobulbs with the flower spikes coming from the base of the bulb. There were a number of *Pleurothallis species macra*, *viduata*, *dunstervillea* & one unknown species all exhibiting their peculiar habit of producing their small flowers from the petiole of the leaf rather than from the stem of the plant. Because these flowers are small they are often only seen at species clubs meetings where their true beauty is appreci-

ated.

Another small orchid is *Aerangis hyaloides* a species from Madagascar the whole plant was only about 10cms tall but covered in almost transparent pure white spidery 10mm flowers arranged distichously (side by side) on 60mm long racemes, a delightful little species that under South Australian conditions does require some winter protection.

At the other end of the spectrum was a specimen of *Schomburgkia moyobambae* closely related to the genus Laelia. When not in flower vegetatively they do indeed look just like a Laelia but the identifying characteristic is the tall flower spike. The one at the meeting was about 90cms long standing erect from the apex of the pseudobulb. To view the head of magenta coloured, twisted flowers the pot had to be placed on the floor where the flowers were then at eye level.

Others too numerous to mention individually were Sigmatochilus radicans, Epidendrum corifolium, Disparis spp, Maxillaria porphyrostele, Pterostylis curta, Mormolyca ringens, Laelia anceps, Epidendron ciliare, Diuris pardina, Paphiopedilum greatrixianum, Oncidium maculatum, Serapius lingua, Dendrobium kingianum, Brassia gireoudiana, Dendrobium nathanulensis, Sacochilus ceciliae, Dendrobium aemulum & Pterostylis curta var Alba. The meeting concluded at around 9.30 with a cup of tea and much discussion on the orchids benched.

On the bench at the August 2006 Meeting.

This month, and heading towards the end of winter / beginning of spring, the numbers of plants on the bench increased, particularly in Open and Second Divisions.

I would strongly request that members place their plants on the tables(s) provided so that the rostered judges can then place them in their correct classes for judging and that members do not enter the judging area prior to the meeting. As the number of plants increases the benching area becomes very crowded and we saw a number of situations where flowers could have been accidentally

damaged. We definitely do not want to see that happen to your

flowers or those of other members.

Flower of Second Division and flower of the night: *Lc.* Burgundy Gem grown by Anne and Colin Campbell. *Lc.* Brugundy Gem is a small growing plant. It had nine growths with the lead carrying an inflorescence with one bud and one open well shaped and filled in flower. The sepals and petals were rich rose-purple as was the label-

lum which had a deep purple patch on the mid-lobe and was yellow towards the throat. One parent of this plant is the species *Laelia pumila*, the flowers of which are described as being between 8 and 11 cm across with rich rose-purple sepals and petals and a similarly coloured labellum with a white throat and a dark purple area on the mid-lobe. The other parent, the hybrid *Cattleya* Angelwalker, has two principal species *C. walkeriana* and

C. loddigesii in its background. *C. walkeriana* is similar in colour to *L. pumila* while the *C. loddigesii* is paler but has somewhat broader flower segments.

Flower of First Division: Den Anne's Rainbow Surprise benched by David and Kay Camack was a moderately large plant carrying six

inflorescences with open flowers and three more still all in bud. The flowers were 55mm wide x 70mm across with purple sepals and

petals shading to cream at their base. The central lobe of the broad labellum was light purple with a dark purple central stripe and the side lobes were white/cream spotted with fine light purple-pink.

Flower of open Division: Dockrillia teretifolia Grown by John and Bev. Gay. A very well grown and flowered example of the species mounted on what appeared to be a piece of a branch. The plant was very floriferous with some 500 flowers in all. The flowers were large and of good shape the sepals and



petals were white and the reflexed white labellum had a row of fine maroon spots along each side.

Other plants on the bench:

In second division there was another smaller plant of *Dock. teretifolia* growing on a piece of cork benched by Rod and Judy McRedmond. It had 11 inflorescences carrying up to eight inverted flowers, as they always are in this species. Sepals and petals were white shading to pale green towards their bases and the white labellum was spotted in deep maroon.

In first division the hybrid *Zygopetalum* Titanic was benched by Murray Baulderstone. This plant resulted from a crossing of two other *Z*. Titanic hybrids. It was a small plant carrying one inflorescence of three flowers 55mm across x 60mm high. Sepals and petals were broad, very dark brown with a few small greenish markings and a very fine greenish-yellow edging. The very heavily purple striped white broad labellum was very flat, i.e. in the same plane as the other flower segments. In open division Tony Deionno benched a very nice non-Australian native Dendrobium hybrid, *Den.* Doreen x Anouk x Sagarik which, although heavily influenced by *Den. bigibbum* (*syn. Den. phalaenopsis*) there are other *Den. species* in its background which are not Aussie natives. Doreen is 90% *Den. bigibbum*, Anouk is 75% *bigibbum* and Sagarik is 62.5% *bigibbum* but without knowing which two were paired to make one of the parents it is impossible to know the exact portion of *Den. bigibbum* it contains. One cane had three inflorescences, one with 8 open flowers, one with 7 open flowers and 3 buds and the third with three open flowers. Two other canes had inflorescences still in bud. The flowers were 70mm across and 63mm high, the sepals and petals were purple shading to paler and to cream at their base and were complimented by a deep purple labellum. Ian Attenborough

Hi Everyone, Our Guest Speaker today was Mr Don Nesbitt, who gave us an excellent insight into growing of Oncidium Orchids or "Dancing Ladies" as they are commonly known as. Don stated that they liked plenty of light and plenty of air movement and for this he usually hangs them up high in his shade-house which has the white 50% on top, this he usually covers with 50% black shade-cloth in the summer, he also waters early in the morning to increase the humidity that they love. In the Winter, Don only waters once a week but in the Summer he waters daily, he uses a soluble fertilizer like Macrocote Red and Peter's Orchid formula No 5 and he's quite happy with the results on his plants. Don's potting mix is a medium bark, marble chips and foam granules and also tries to use the port pots as they have a lot more holes in the bottom which allows the mix to dry out a lot quicker, and Don usually repots his plants each year to keep them moving along. We also viewed some slides of various Oncidiums which were great. Don also bought along a few of his plants that were in flower to show us which we all appreciated, especially a lovely dark red one, which I'm sure he could have sold at least twenty times over if he wanted as everyone loved it, but he did have few other plants for sale which the Members snapped up. There were quite a few of the Oncidium Allience plants on our display table which were brought in by our Members which pleased Don greatly as he was able to give a brief talk on them as well. Thanks Don for a job well done. I'm sure we all learnt something. Our popular vote today was won by "Yours Truly", a lovely surprise, the plant being Mich Pagan love Song "Ruby Charles", this plant last year only had 5 flowers, this year there were 20 flowers, it usually lives out in the shade-house with Cyms until the flowers started to show colour then it was moved under cover. This year I wrapped a piece of cotton-wool around the bottom flower to stop anything crawling up spike and ruining the flowers - it really worked as all the flowers were OK.

A big Thankyou to all the other Members who bought in their plants to share with us - a lovely selection, all very clean and well grown.

Congratulations to you all. A big, big cheerio to Mr Norman Gitsham, we all send our very Best Wishes to you, and all hope you will be back with us again soon. Bye, Dorothy.


